Did You Know?

You Can Save Your Checkout History

Want to know what you've checked out before, perhaps recall the titles you used last year for a specific unit of study? By default we don't save your checkout history, but you can opt in. Log into your account on lincc.org by clicking My Account, then go the Account Information tab, click on Preferences at the bottom, and click the checkbox for Enable My Checkout History. Keep in mind that the system will only start recording your history from that moment forward.


Drop in for hands-on STEAM activities at the library on January's Early Release Day.



Love In The Library


by Maggie Tokuda-Hall

Fall Down Seven Times, Stand Up Eight

This story of grit and courage pays homage to both Patsy Mink, the first woman of color elected to Congress, and to the passing of the Title IX law which changed the future for women by allowing them opportunities equal to those of their male counterparts.



Underground Railroad

From the in-demand nonfiction series *History Smashers* comes a title which exposes the myths, lies, and little known facts about what really happened in The Underground Railroad. Respectful, informative, and extremely engaging.



Answers In The Pages

by David Levithan

Three stories from different periods of time, all told through they eyes of children, are interwoven around a theme of banning books. Written with regard for both sides, this thought-provoking novel offers a necessary lens with which to look at a child's right to read.



Attack of the Black Rectangles

by Amy Sarig King

A bold and skillfully written novel about censorship and intolerance where many freedoms, intellectual and otherwise, are addressed. You'll cheer for these characters who have been taught to think, speak up, and discuss challenging issues in ways that are both respectful and effective.
